Front leg amputees have a more difficult time walking as 65-70% of a dog's balance is on their front legs. Hector is not a recent amputee based on how he moves, sits, and stands, and has adjusted well to the loss of his front leg (and is a perfect candidate for a prosthesis) but GPRA was the only one willing to pull him from the shelter.

Shortly after rescuing Hector, we then received

a call from an Alabama resident who had a stray

into the trash, and when they picked her up and got to the shelter they realized she was a recent mama. The neighbor whose trash can was being raided started looking and found 8 puppies under the house. The owner didn't even realize the dog was pregnant, but Mama and Puppies were reunited at the shelter and yes GPRA was once again

In between the puppy litters we took in Isabelle, a 3-month-old female who was with another rescue after they sent her

siblings north for their fur-ever homes. They kept her because she has a Grade 4/6 heart murmur. We also rescued Chief, a 3-year-old male tied on a chain in the back yard because family circumstances took a downturn. In addition to the shelter and critical need dogs, GPRA constantly receives calls and emails from owners wanting to surrender their dogs for whatever reason — moving, life circumstances and sometimes they just don't want the dog any longer. We take as many
